Career Technology Education (CTE)

An Overview

It's hard to believe that ¼ of the school year is almost complete. During this time the CTE Department has been a busy place, with many things to share. We have continued to enjoy success in both the classroom and with extra-curricular activities. I'd like to introduce you to the newest members of our CTE family:

Business & Computer Management Systems

Members of Mr. Hahne's Computer Science III class have been learning how to create interacting "classes" associated with array implementations. This is a very important topic to learn and understand as the remainder of the course will be devoted to the use of "classes" that relate to one-another. In the Computer Science I classes students have been quite successful with their use of Visual Basic. All Mr. Hahne's programming students will be competing in the American Computer Science League (ACSL). ACSL is an international competition that spans the entire year giving students the opportunity to sharpen their theory and programming skills. Four competitions are held throughout the school year with scores for both individual and team totals rewarded through invitation to the All-Star Meet held over the Memorial Day Weekend (Saturday). This year I'm proud to announce that the All-Star Meet will be held at our very own Marriotts Ridge High School. This is a wonderful honor for our school. Meanwhile, in the Advanced Object Oriented Design (AOOD) class the students have been given the unique opportunity to create a business environment where they can apply the AOOD curricula. What's of interest is the fact this implementation is a true example of "school to work" initiatives as the projects that teams of students complete are built for real-world customers. Affiliated with Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA), the AOOD programming group is known to our clients as 'Stang Software. Our main form of business is web design and graphic layouts. What's of interest with this course lies in the way in which we do business. Face-to-face client-student interaction to help with the development process is followed by team design and programming creation, all of which is shared with the client as the process proceeds. The students have true ownership of the product and we have found that clients enjoy the face-to-face students interaction as their website or graphic program is developed.

Community Outreach

This year, as in past years, we will be offering our Technology Opportunities program to community members, and staff and students of Marriotts Ridge and Mt. View Middle Schools. A set of diverse topics has been scheduled from web design through game programming. Also, last year several of you indicated a need for some basic Word and Excel support, so we have included those opportunities too. AP exams. Sixteen students averaged 3.78 and were named AP Scholars with Honor and 21 students, averaging 4.18, were recognized as AP Scholars with Distinction. Almost 50% of our students who participated in AP testing were chosen ... congratulations to our students, AP teachers, and MRHS Scholars Program Coordinator Bob Siskind!

In **other state and national programs**, Marriotts Ridge was once again well represented. Among over 5,000 applicants in the **Maryland Distinguished Scholar Program**, 34 MRHS students were accorded Achievement Honorable Mention and six were named Semi Finalists. In addition, earning \$3,000 yearly scholarships to any Maryland college or university, Zach Essner and Emily Huang were named Maryland Distinguished Scholar Finalists. In the Maryland Distinguished Scholar talent category, five Mustang students earned Honorable Mention and Laura Gilbert and Anna Wettig were designated Distinguished Scholar Finalists in Dance, also earning \$3,000 scholarships to state schools. Finally, in the **National Merit Program**, 24 students were named National Merit Commended Scholars, Meagan Peaco was chosen as a National Achievement Scholar, and five students were recognized as National Merit Semi Finalists ... Zach Essner, Theresa Geckle, Igo Khrustalev, Colleen Quinlan, and Brendan Wray. Congratulations to all of our award winners, their families, and our staff!

We have thoroughly enjoyed experiencing a full building this year with all four classes. **It is great to see so many kids involved in clubs, fine arts programs, and sports teams.** Over 40 clubs are alive at Marriotts Ridge ... we want to particularly highlight our community service and recycling clubs for all that they are doing to serve our community in so many ways. Our Math Team scored a division victory at a recent county meet, an outstanding edition of *The Stallion* was published, the Marching Band looks great, the list goes on ... On the sports front, we are excited by the competitive spirit that is exhibited from beginning to end every day ... three of our teams ... boys soccer, girls soccer, and volleyball have been ranked or received similar consideration. Our football, cross country, field hockey, golf, and cheerleading teams have thrilled us all many times throughout the fall. As mentioned above regarding Spirit Week, our SGA and Class Councils continue to grow and develop into a wonderful group of student leaders ... the Senior Class Crab Feast was a huge success and another "Famous First at the Ridge." Taking place right before this article was being submitted, we must single out our first stage production of the year that brought so many different types of students together to put together a great show ... **Jukebox III** ... wow ... amazing ... they keep getting better and better! Congratulations to all of our students and staff members who are involved in so many endeavors!

While we are charging ahead in many ways, **we must also mention a few things that we hope to improve upon in the upcoming months.** We would appreciate your support in discussing school cleanliness with your students ... our cafeteria, hallways, and bathrooms belong to us and we need to treat them as if they were part of our own homes. Keeping all electronic devices out of the academic environment during the school day would make things easier for everyone. As we have looked back, we are very pleased about what has been accomplished and look forward to trying some new things as the year goes on, especially our Senior Year activities and Graduation. We want to thank our students for making the right choices each day and our families for supporting us as we challenge all of our students to achieve in many different ways. Our staff must be commended for all of their hard work and dedication to doing whatever it takes for our students.

Environmental Club



Who are we?

The Environmental Club is a new group at MRHS made up of students who are hoping to raise environmental awareness in our community through recycling, planting, and conserving resources.

What are we doing?

- Recycling program – we have set up recycling bins in teacher's classrooms for paper and in the cafeteria for bottles and cans – please take notice!
- Beautification/planting – our next project involves planting a variety of trees/flowers in exclusive areas on school grounds.
- Green school – we are hoping to gain the title of a Green School, something only one other high school in Howard County has achieved. This is done through showing that our school is environmentally aware and takes action to prove this.
- Energy conservation – we are encouraging MRHS to reduce the use of unnecessary electricity – it saves time, nature, and money!
- Envirothon – this is a problem-solving natural resource competition for high school students. Teams of high school students are tested on their knowledge of a state's natural resources. The Maryland Envirothon will take place at Harford Glen Environmental Education center in Harford County on June 17–19, 2008.
- Fundraiser – we will soon be starting a fundraiser to help collect money for our various projects (especially the beautification project) – this fundraiser will collect electronic supplies that families no longer have uses for.
